

CELEBRATING LENT IN COVID TIMES

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By the time you read this, we will be into the season of Lent. It has been one year since coronavirus, COVID, social distancing and masks have become part of our everyday experience. Vaccines have begun but it will take time for an entire nation of our size to be able to receive the necessary dose. Hope abounds for the future but patience is still required as we move forward at a snail's pace. As the Pastoral Staff of the parish prepared for this Lenten season we were very much aware that it would again be different from the norm. Although churches are open there remains no obligation to attend Sunday Mass and smaller than usual in-person attendance continues to be the norm. We want to offer opportunities for prayer but we also want to keep people safe and healthy. Our guidelines still require masks and social distancing within our worship space. Listed below are the activities taking place at St. Christopher Church during the Lenten season. Keep in mind that this list was prepared prior to the start of Lent and circumstances may require some changes as the journey towards Easter continues. Consult our website (stchrisparish.com) for changes and updates and watch for the Constant Contact emails sent weekly to parishioners.

• We are following our normal weekend Mass schedule: Saturday at 5 p.m. and Sunday at 8:30, 10:00 and 11:30 a.m.

• The Saturday evening Mass will be livestreamed and available to watch on YouTube, the Parish website or on the Parish Facebook page.

March 2021

- Weekday Masses will be at 11:00 a.m. Monday through Friday.
- Rosary Devotion will take place on Wednesdays at 10:30 a.m. (prior to 11 a.m. Mass).
- Stations of the Cross will be held in the church on Wednesdays following the 11 a.m. Mass and on Fridays at 7 p.m.
- There will be a Holy Hour and Benediction on Tuesdays from 5-6 p.m.
- Confessions will be heard in the church on Saturdays from 4-4:30 p.m.
- Holy Week will begin with the normal Mass schedule on Palm Sunday, March 27-28 and palms will be made available.
- Mass on Holy Thursday will be at 7 p.m. (livestreamed). Adoration will continue in church following Mass until 11 p.m.
- Stations of the Cross on Good Friday at noon and 7 p.m. Weather permitting, the noon Stations will be held outdoors in Centennial Park.
- The Good Friday Service will be at 3 p.m. (livestreamed).
- The Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday will be at 8:30 p.m. (livestreamed).
- Easter Sunday Masses will follow the normal schedule at 8:30, 10:00, and 11:30 a.m.
- All of the Masses on Easter Sunday will be livestreamed.

In addition to these liturgical/devotional opportunities, the Pastoral Staff will be offering some additional Lenten activities. Admittedly, some of these will already be in process by the time you read this. Others, however, may still be available for your participation. I encourage you to visit our website and watch for our weekly Constant Contact email for the latest details on all the activities listed in this article.

LENT, CONT'D

Lenten Family Bags: These were made available by Sharon Armstrong, our Director of Religious Education, to our School and PSR families prior to the beginning of Lent. The bags contain age-appropriate activities for students and families throughout the Lenten Season.

Mini-Retreat: Robin Imbrigiotta, our Pastoral Associate, is offering this Lenten opportunity on the first three Saturdays of Lent (February 20 and 27, and March 6) from 9 a.m. to noon. This retreat is available either in-person or by Zoom.

Lenten Gospels by Zoom: Different members of the Pastoral Staff will lead a discussion and reflection on the Gospels of Lent. This will take place on the Monday evening prior to each Sunday at 7 p.m. These discussions will take place on Zoom. Check the website and weekly Constant Contact for the link to join on any Monday: February 15 and 22; March 1, 8, 15, & 22.

FROM MISSION TO MISSION

Cleveland's fundraising team for non-profit, **From Mission to Mission (FMTM),** which serves missionary priests and religious returning to the United States after serving abroad, extends heartfelt gratitude for the generosity of St. Christopher parishioners this past fall. Hosting the agency's 40th anniversary fundraiser via an online auction and livestream program, the group exceeded their outreach and financial goals. A very special thank you to Fr. John Chlebo for serving on the advisory committee and supporting the effort in so many ways. The event would not have been possible without the expertise of Pastoral Minister Logan Feldkamp and his technical team. The members of FMTM and all those who benefit from its supportive programs are eternally grateful.

CHRISTMAS LIVESTREAMING DEMONSTRATES STRONG ONLINE GROWTH

The presence of the Coronavirus pandemic paired with the issuance of a winter storm warning created a significant impact on in-person Mass attendance during Christmas weekend. While numbers in the pews were down, virtual engagement flourished, demonstrating the importance of our livestreaming system that was introduced in November. Our livestreamed Masses recorded over 4,000 views throughout the four-day weekend. Of these, 30% of our views were "live," watching our Mass take place in real time. Nearly 2,100 unique devices tuned into our streams over Christmas weekend.



Considering that several members of the same family occasionally gather around a single device to watch Mass, we estimate that somewhere between 4,000 and 6,000 people watched a Christmas Mass from home this year. While this figure is slightly lower than our average in-person Christmas attendance in nonpandemic years, we remain encouraged by the number of visitors who paid a visit to our digital services.



The months of research and monetary resources (in excess of \$20,000) that fund our livestreaming system have generated results worthy of the investment. Over 95%


of our Christmas attendance occurred virtually, highlighting the importance of our stream for those with snow-buried cars, compromised immune systems, and out-of-town travelers. At the time of writing, average online Mass views have doubled from 220 in October to 460 in December during the two months our streaming service has been active. Our months of preparation and research for installing our system proved vital for our ability to share the joy and comfort of our Christmas liturgy with all of you. It is my goal to continue our online growth in an effort to bring the Gospel and love of our community to others. Thank you for your financial and prayerful support of these projects at our parish!

AN UNPRECEDENTED LENT AND EASTER

It has been more than a year since an unprecedented pandemic drastically changed our lives forever. That it occurred in the middle of Lent was particularly alarming: all of the Catholic traditions we hold so dear during this holy season were cancelled. Suddenly we were like the Israelites wandering in the desert, not sure what to do next. Fortunately, we have the assurance of a God who never abandons us. In this era of "unprecedented" technological advances, churches like ours were forced to quickly make the adjustment to online services. Thanks to our ever-present God, we were able to not only survive but in many ways thrive in the midst of such calamity. We now have the advantage of viewing our weekly Eucharistic celebration anytime from anywhere as many times as we wish. We can listen to our inspiring homilies repeatedly.

This year Lent began on February 17. It is certain that we will not yet return 100% to the way things were, but we are now better prepared and have more freedom to worship in person. We approach Lent as our 40 days of reflection and repentance as we prepare to commemorate the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Christ. We enter into this period of Lenten contemplation as we always do - praying and hoping that we are transformed into the most Christ-like followers we can be. This amazing transformation can come only when we let go of worldly attachments and surrender completely to God's will. We avoid detouring into other activities and robbing our Savior of the harvest he deserves. This usually means changing the way we do things, reassessing priorities, trading bad (self-centered) habits for good (other-centered) ones. Today it could mean taking a break from television, non-stop news, the internet and social media. Maybe we can avoid topics (i.e., politics) and people that cause us to respond in negative ways. Instead, we can choose to spend that time in prayerful contemplation, asking God to take charge of our lives. If we pay attention, our bodies warn us about situations (and people) that may cause us emotional pain, and we make our choices accordingly. Certainly we can let go of things we have no control over, respect all people, choose to love and forgive. St. Teresa of Calcutta is famous for her simple but powerful advice for just about every difficulty - "pray and forgive."

To focus on what matters most – our personal relationship with Christ – we have discovered countless new ways to support our journey. When used as God intended, modern technology is an amazing, priceless tool. We now access online inspirational nuggets via facebook, YouTube, applications (apps) and live streaming. We can thank our very own pastoral, technology and music ministry teams for making these available to us. Social gatherings have continued, albeit virtually. Catholic radio (local and satellite) and cable television (EWTN) bring us videos featuring spiritually fulfilling programs from around the world. If we truly seek meaningful spiritual outlets, they are plentiful and accessible (most of them free of charge/search the internet for Catholic apps and programs). In the many layers of 2020 turbulence and loss, we turn to God more fervently in prayer, thanksgiving, repentance and humility.



Though there is nothing like gathering in person as one, holy, Catholic, apostolic church, we are reminded that God is always in our midst. St. Augustine famously prays to God: "Our heart is restless until it rests in you." We become restless when we leave God out of our lives. Thanks to our pastoral team, we continue to participate not only in weekly Mass but in a multitude of online worship services. St. Christopher continues to guide our youth, comfort our grieving, celebrate the Sacraments, pray the Rosary together, stay connected and grow spiritually as a faith community. We know that no matter how much the world changes, our God remains the same: a Creator who always was, is now and always will be. One of the Bible's most popular phrases is "do not be afraid," and indeed we must have unwavering trust in God in order to survive life's many challenges. God told Joshua (v. 1:9), "Be strong and of good courage; be not frightened, neither be dismayed; for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." We believe and take comfort in this promise by praying from our hearts, not just our lips. It is only then that we can experience His peace which surpasses all understanding. "When righteousness, peace and joy increase, the kingdom of God is advancing." (Romans 14:17). This year, more than ever, we need the powerful impact of Lent and the glorious promise of the Resurrection.

A COVID CHRISTMAS

Twas the night before Christmas and all around the town, the snow was a blowing and the temperature was a dropping! Our first and, hopefully last, COVID Christmas was far from merry. What the CDC and the Diocese of Cleveland could not accomplish encouraging people not to gather in large crowds, God took care of with a mighty snow storm. People did not venture out into the wintry mess and Christmas Mass attendance was incredibly low. The in-person total attendance for the six Masses was 234! This is far less than the 4,000 people who typically worship here at St. Christopher on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. It was even less than our normal weekend Mass attendance has been since our return to church in late May. Yes, the snowy weather was certainly a factor in keeping attendance low but many chose to stay safe and healthy by avoiding the anticipated crowds.


It was definitely a different feeling in the church. The large crowds, smiling and happy faces and parishioners singing the familiar hymns were sadly missing. The church was decorated and the manger scene was in place but missing were the people who give life to this holy place. Yet Christmas did come and we did celebrate the birth of Jesus, our Savior.

On a positive note, the live streaming of the Masses for Christmas and the following weekend was highly successful. Approximately 2,075 devices tuned into our streaming over the four-day period. Most of the devices would typically have 2-4 people watching. That would bring the total number of viewers to well over 4,000 people.

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We are very happy to be able to provide this service and even more happy that so many are watching. We will continue to livestream our Saturday evening Mass at 5 p.m. each weekend.

Perhaps this year we were able to focus a bit more on the real meaning of December 25. There may have been fewer parties and get-togethers, replaced by masks and social distancing. Maybe there were a few less gifts bought and exchanged but a deeper



appreciation of the gift of family and friends who may not have been able to spend the time with each other as they would have liked. In this challenging time we were reminded of Emmanuel, our God with us, as indeed He is. As this year of 2021 progresses and vaccine distribution expands, may our focus on God and prayer remain an important part of our lives. May our faith sustain us, our hope inspire us and our love contribute to supporting one another on our shared journey through these COVID times.

CALLED FOR MORE

Coming soon to all parishes in the Diocese of Cleveland is a survey entitled, **Called For More.** This is a national program prepared by the Catholic Leadership Institute and already done in 37 dioceses in the United States. It is designed to listen to parishioners in support of parish and priestly life. The hope is to obtain an ideal leadership profile of priests, an ideal profile of a parish and a snapshot of the faith journey of parishioners.

The main instrument of the program is a 75-question survey for all parishioners to reflect on two things, individual spiritual growth and engagement with the parish. The survey should take 10-15 minutes to complete through an online link. Paper copies will be available for those who prefer that method. Experience so far has shown that most responses come from people who attend church and are involved in the parish with some pre-COVID regularity. The survey will hopefully indicate what keeps people engaged in their parish and what things might prompt others to drift away. This in turn will help prepare them to be disciple makers in the parish. This could prove helpful as we return to "normal life" and seek to invite people back to worship and involvement in the parish.

This article is a brief "heads up" to what will be coming in the near future, possibly even by the time you are reading this. We are still learning details ourselves. Some might wonder how this will be different from the parish survey we did in 2018. That was a helpful process for our parish and the Pastoral Council continues to develop goals and action steps as a follow-up, with many items already in place. This diocesan survey will support and augment what we are already doing and further validate and encourage goals and plans we are already trying to implement in our community. Stay tuned for further information as it becomes available and thank you for your support of our parish.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK 2021

St. Christopher School's annual celebration of Catholic Schools Week was held January 31-February 5. Unlike in year's past the school was unable to host an Open House, hold an art show, celebrate a school family Mass in the Church, or hold special assemblies. As they've done throughout the school year, however, the SCS Knights demonstrated flexibility and determination and were able to celebrate CSW in a meaningful way.

The week began and ended with two spirit days; Monday for the lower grades and Friday for the upper ones. Each grade level met in the parish gym for Clash of the Classes; a series of grade level competitions. Activities included minute-to-win-it challenges, athletic events, relay races, and an obstacle course. On Tuesday, an all school Mass was held. Students in grades 7-8 attended in the church, while those in grades 3-6 watched the Mass remotely from the Parish Center. Students in grades K-2 watched the Mass in their classrooms. Staff members served as Eucharistic Ministers, giving students in the Parish Center the opportunity to receive Communion.

A highlight of every Catholic Schools Week in the school's talent show and this year was no different. Unlike in years past, the 2021 talent show was a virtual one. Students, whether working individually or in small groups, recorded their performances at home. These in turn were combined into an hour long video presentation that was streamed to the individual classrooms; allowing the students to enjoy the show with their classmates. Our students and staff were treated to a variety of acts; including musical, dance, athletic, and comedic performances. School closed on Friday with a St. Christopher School standard – the all school BINGO game. The 8th grade student council officers called the game remotely and students competed for a variety of exciting prizes.

The St. Christopher School students and staff would like to thank the entire parish community for their continued support of our school. We are already looking forward to CSW 2022 and being able to welcome the parish community back into the school.





A LABOR OF LOVE



In the past two years, we have seen articles in the Belltower Beacon describing the concept, development and building of our beautiful Centennial Park. We have had a chance to enjoy it for several months now and are grateful for a mild winter that allows us to be outside during a year of too many restrictions. Our new multi-purpose park was made possible through the collaboration of many committed supporters. It has become a true gem not only for St. Christopher families but for the larger community as well. One of the devoted members of the construction team is general contractor and long-time parishioner Mike Buddie. Citing his "big attachment to St. Chris," Mike's work on Centennial Park was a personal labor of love. He, his parents and siblings joined St. Christopher when Mike was age 11; he raised his own children here and now has grandchildren at the school.

Mike and Carol Buddie, owners of F. Buddie Construction, are well known for their involvement in the church and school, for their undying support of parish life, and now for the company's construction of the spectacular Centennial Park, which quickly became the favorite location for parish Masses, youth group meetings, and parish and school activities and gatherings. In the era of church closings, face masks, social distancing, and heightened safety measures, the opening of the Park happened in God's perfect timing. The parents who conceived of replacing the outdated playground for the Park could not have imagined how useful it would become when faced with a pandemic two years later. F. Buddie Construction turned a dream into reality just in time!

Frank Buddie started his construction business in 1956 and earned an excellent reputation with homeowners in the area. Mike tells the story of his dad enrolling the children at the day school before building their home and being told by the nuns that he couldn't possibly have their home ready before school started. Three generations later, there are still Buddie children at our school and the number continues to grow. Mike and Carol, originally from New Jersey, met at the University of Dayton. They are the proud parents of four and delighted grandparents of nine. Their son, Kevin, is a civil engineer who works for the family business and was instrumental in making Centennial Park the success that it is. He and his wife, Mindy, are parishioners and parents of three boys. Their daughter and her husband, Karen and Andrew Robison, are also raising their family at St. Christopher. The other adult children are Ryan, who is married to Julia, and Greg. Mike and Carol enjoy skiing Lake Tahoe in winter and fishing the Metro Parks in summer. They have been involved at St. Christopher for many years, promulgating many initiatives at the school and the church. Carol uses her pro-life passion to spread the word, to raise funds for Birthright (where she is a Trustee), and to make our embroidered Baptismal bibs available to young families.

The concept for Centennial Park came from parents concerned about the aged condition of the former play space, used for hours each day for student recess, outdoor gym and other activities. Furthermore, it has always been a popular gathering space for neighborhood families that do not belong to the parish. Over a period of two years, the idea grew into actual plans, deadlines, ground-breaking and construction. The planning committee launched a fundraising campaign which included selling personalized brick pavers (still available for purchase). Thanks to the extraordinary generosity of parishioners, the project reached completion. It was officially blessed at an outdoor Mass in August with a large group in attendance, not only seated throughout the park but also sitting in their cars. Fr. John is extremely grateful that we are preparing for a new century of service to our community. He has stated: "Thank you for being the people you are, for the generosity you demonstrate and for your faith that shows itself in good works toward others." In its 64 years of business, F. Buddie Contracting Ltd. has left a legacy of satisfied customers, a tradition being continued by Mike and his crew. When asked, Mike stated that one of his favorite parts of the job is seeing a project go from an idea and a dream to the finished product and a satisfied customer. In addition to Centennial Park being a labor of love, Mike and the team enjoyed working with Fr. John, principal Scott Raiff and other staff. They are "a great group to work with," and have the best interests of students and parishioners in mind at all times. It goes without saying that a great deal of time, work and resources went into creating such an amazing green space. Destiny walked us through each of the five wines and explained why the pairings worked so well with each one. She also shared the unique 'Cleveland' attributes about her winery, production, staff, and wines themselves. Throughout the night, we learned about the five S's of tasting wine (See, Swirl, Smell, Sip, Savor) and what it means when wine has legs. There was also a quick shout-out to Moriah House and an update on how well they have supported our sisters in need during this exceptionally challenging time. At the end of the event, door prizes that were generously donated by the Ladies Guild were given away and we all said good night.

Although it was certainly not what we pictured for the 4th Annual Ladies Night Out, it was a success. Our goal for the evening was to celebrate our community and to see each other's smiling faces. Not only did we accomplish that goal, but we also had great wine and a few laughs as well. I know our virtual wine tasting doesn't replace the traditional event, or even come close to making up for all of the cancelled events in 2020. LUNCH SERVED WITH A SMILE



Working in a grade school cafeteria may not be for the faint of heart, but these long-time St. Christopher school cafeteria employees make it look easy, and all agree that working with

each other is one of the things they love most about their jobs. All of them are St. Christopher parishioners and began working in the cafeteria while they had children attending St. Christopher School. As pictured left to right are Lisa Bill, Denise Oswald, Colleen Moore, and Christina Ward.

On a typical day in the cafeteria, Lisa Bill and Colleen Moore are in the kitchen preparing and serving the food, while Denise Oswald and Christina Ward are in the cafeteria running the registers, helping the children as needed and cleaning between lunch periods. As you might imagine, lunch time during a global pandemic is somewhat different than it had been in previous years.

Colleen Moore, who has been a St. Christopher parishioner since 1988 started working in the cafeteria in 2001. That was the year that the parish center was completed, and St. Christopher School started the hot lunch program. Her three children attended St. Christopher School and two of her three sons were attending St. Christopher at the time she started. Each day they are joined by one or two St. Christopher school parent volunteers for the four lunch periods. The children are spread out at many more tables than were used in years past to allow for distancing. They also have implemented more in-depth cleaning procedures between lunches and at the end of the day. Serving the food now takes a bit longer. There is no more "grab and go," as they must hand all items to the children rather than allow them to take their own. Everything they have implemented has helped to keep the kids safe and healthy, but still allow them to enjoy their lunchtime per Mrs. Moore.

Pre-covid the children were able to move around after eating and were able to play ping pong and air hockey on tables that had been donated to the school. The tables remain in storage and will be back in use when it is safer to use them. Though the tables made lunch periods louder, typically the cafeteria ladies were glad when the children were enjoying themselves. On occasion lunch periods would get a little TOO loud and boisterous. It was during one of these times that Mrs. Ward said she pointed out a black mark on the wall and jokingly told the children that it was a hidden camera to keep an eye on their behavior. That quieted them down a little - at least for that day!

A fun tradition that they have been able to continue during the pandemic is "Ticket Tuesday." Each student who buys a hot lunch on Tuesdays is entered into a drawing to win an ice cream voucher. The drawing each week seems to be quite exciting for the kids based on the noise level. "It's always a fun and successful lunch time if the noise level is high," according to Mrs. Bill.

Additionally, Mr. Scott Raiff, who is in his sixth year as principal at St. Christopher School, really engages with the children in the cafeteria which makes the lunch time experience more positive for both the students and the cafeteria staff. Whether it is involving students with picking or announcing the winner of Ticket Tuesday, asking his many trivia questions, or in prior years playing ping pong or air hockey with the students, his positivity is appreciated. His dedication to the students was on display when twice, in the same week, he and Mrs. Bill searched through all the garbage to find a student's lost retainer according to Mrs. Oswald.

Though this year has proven challenging the "lunch ladies" all appreciate the way Father John, parish staff, teachers and staff, students and families and their suppliers have all worked together to ensure a safe cafeteria environment.

St. Christopher School and parish are lucky to have this dedicated group of ladies as a part of our community. Thank you for all you do for our school!
