ST. CHRISTOPHER UKRAINE WELCOME CIRCLE Welcomes the Kushnyr family to America

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For a sixyear-old Ukrainian boy whose world was turned upside down in the most horrific way, his rally cry became "Mama, when are we going to

America?" This was his daily question and plea as his mom, Valeriia Kushnyr, tried to balance life in Poland where she had escaped to deliver their second child safely. Her husband, Dmytro, remained in Ukraine for a year and Valeriia found herself without the support of family, friends and coworkers. In a very short and violent period of time, everything that was familiar and dear to them was gone. One sad description of their hometown is that it "now looked like a pancake," completely flattened by the atrocities of hatred and war. As soon as she was able, Valeriia began applying for a sponsor family to help them come to America. As soon as Valeriia was made aware that they were being considered by the St. Christopher Ukraine Welcome Circle, the hope of bringing her children (six-year-old son Dariush and infant daughter Aniela) to safety and freedom brought the courage she needed to continue to persevere. Her resilience and strength paid off when after a year without her children's father, Dmytro, the family of four was approved to come to Cleveland. Dmytro had joined the family in Poland after a year apart from them.

Ultimately, the family was notified on April 21, that they had been authorized to travel to the

United States. Airline tickets were purchased immediately, and they prepared to fly from Warsaw to Amsterdam and then Cleveland. Dariush's dream of coming to America was about to unfold. At 2:21 a.m. on Thursday, April 27, the grateful family of four was received at Hopkins International by members of the UWC team. Team member and Russian interpreter, Rob Jamieson of St. Mary Church in Elyria, came to the airport to ensure the family's communication needs were met. After long hours in the air (plus delays in Atlanta, GA), they arrived with warm smiles, eager to meet our group and see their new home. The smiling faces of the children and Darius clutching his stuffed Spiderman toy made all the effort worthwhile. In the wee hours of the morning, the most important thing that all shared was immense gratitude. The family was driven to their fully furnished and well stocked home in Parma's Ukrainian Village. The Kushnyrs' gratitude and surprise were expressed nonverbally as well as verbally. With a few words they had learned in English (including "wow") and tears of joy, they once again let the team know how grateful they are for all that the community of St. Christopher has done for them. In his homily on the day of their arrival, Fr. John updated those in attendance. In God's awesome way, the Responsorial Psalm on that day acclaimed "Let all the earth cry out to God with joy." Fr. John surmised how relieved and full of joy the family must be to finally arrive here safely.

The success of this endeavor was and continues to be possible only by the prayers and support of our three priests and the entire pastoral team. It is also crucial to utilize online communication programs and our Sunday Bulletin to reach all parishioners. A member of the UWC team handled publicity with the aid of Pastoral Minister Logan Feldkamp's technological skills.

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Office Manager Dawn Bloom made sure updates were published in a timely manner. As a result, parishioners were invited to become an integral part of this historic event. As usual, the people of St. Christopher answered the call in a huge way. Ensuring that every room was beautifully furnished and decorated was parishioner Tiffany Barker. Volunteers cleaned the home from top to bottom. The children's bedrooms feature safety equipment, bedding, new clothing and age appropriate toys. Parish ministries including the Social Concerns Committee and Ladies Guild reached out to lend a hand assuring that the cupboards and refrigerator were stocked with enough food (meeting dietary and allergy restrictions) for a good start. In addition, other parishes who had gone or were going through the process offered advice and emotional support. On moving day, St. Christopher parishioners loaded furniture and a ministry team from St. Basil Church, Brecksville (called St. Joseph's Fixit Friends) pulled up to the house to help. With donuts, laborers and prayers, they helped unload the moving vans full of household goods that had been donated and stored in the Rectory basement. The show of support from groups near and far is priceless and St. Christopher's team is forever grateful. There are also individuals who helped make this a reality and choose to remain anonymous.



The response from parishioners has been nothing short of remarkable. The fact remains that the most important part of this journey is being lived out now – the family needs us more than ever. From the very start of this sponsorship journey, the community of St. Christopher has been supportive and prayerful on the family's behalf. From preschoolers to senior citizens,

countless individuals participated in raising funds through initiatives like the Ukraine Welcome Circle Box during Lent. Continued donations are needed as we work to meet the family's needs in the coming months. In addition, the family was kept in the minds and hearts of the community through frequent mention at Mass (homilies and in Prayers of the Faithful).

Updates will keep coming for the foreseeable future through the designated web page (stchrisparish.com/uwc), parish email, bulletin announcements and the Belltower Beacon. We realize that welcoming the Kushnyrs to Cleveland is just the first step. Interacting with the family and helping them assimilate into the community will require more support, which will certainly be rewarding as well. Implementing a detailed Welcome Plan required by the Diocese, the team is helping them secure physical, dental and mental health medical services, language skills and school enrollment, and job readiness/employment opportunities. The family will be accompanied to appointments, translators made available and babysitting arranged as needed. A long-time member of the Ukrainian community, Alex Hooke, whose native language is Russian, has been active in our Welcome Circle. He is committed to helping us to help them for as long as necessary. In case you might be wondering, they do have "down time" where they can just relax and visit fun places like the Cleveland Zoo, the MetroParks, Nature Centers, etc. There will also be a trip to St. Christopher in the future so you can meet the family in person.



It is truly amazing that this journey, which began with a call to action by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Cleveland Diocese, then ultimately to our parish community, led to the formation of our Ukraine Welcome Circle. Just a few months ago, Fr. Tim and the core team started meeting to work through diocesan and governmental

requirements. Many meetings later, all requirements were met and we began preparing for their approval. A big step in the process (and the UWC team's favorite part) was the selection of a young family desperately hoping to escape their war-torn country of Ukraine. Perusing the many families who were seeking to enter the U.S., the team knew that our parish (being so family oriented) would appreciate one with children. Through an online translation/interpretation program, team leader Mary Joan Papajcik began frequent communication with Valeriia. Maintaining direct contact with her and receiving photographs of the children helped everyone to stay patient and hopeful. At our end, the team continued to advocate for the family's authorization to travel. There were many detailed requirements imposed by U.S. and Ukrainian authorities as well as Catholic Charities of Cleveland (who has oversight) during the several months of waiting. The Parish Community was kept informed and prayers were offered for God's continued grace. Only through the grace of God and the community's assistance did this become a reality.

On Easter Sunday, Fr. Tim's homily was a beautiful summary of how much the Ukrainian people were suffering and the attempts our parish was making to alleviate the devastation for at least one family. He expressed gratitude and reminded us to pray for the victims of this war and to also pray for the many individuals who were working non-stop to help as many of them escape to safety. We must also remember the many homes in Poland and other regions that are housing those displaced by war. Shortly after the couple's arrival. Fr. Tim visited them and blessed their home. As we continue this Easter season, we continue to walk with our brothers and sisters in need. We live out God's greatest commandments when we love God and love our neighbors every day of our lives. In the words of Pope Saint John Paul II, "we do not pretend that life is all beauty ... we are aware of darkness and sin, poverty and pain ... but Jesus has conquered sin." So it is said that we must actually live like Easter makes a difference in our lives by taking care of each other. Please know that your support of the Kushnyrs is appreciated more than you'll ever know.

LENTEN MISSION 2023 Eucharist: The Whole of Him in the Whole of Us



On March 26, parishioners and friends of St. Christopher parish welcomed Auxiliary Bishop Michael G. Woost as facilitator and presider of this year's Lenten Mission. For three evenings Bishop Woost inspired us, led us in prayer and brought his sense of humor to the large group gathered in the Church. Each evening featured its own readings, music, and commentary by Bishop Woost. Time for quiet reflection and

a symbolic gift were part of each session. Accompanied by Music Ministry Director Bob McMurray, our cantors added their beautiful voices to each evening's message. The objective of the three-day Mission was to guide us into a deeper appreciation of the Eucharist given as Holy Communion. This in turn enables us to live in communion with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and with one another as the Body of Christ, the Church. We were blessed with a Parish Mission that hopes to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist, the source and summit of our Christian lives. According to Bishop Woost, "Nothing is more important or life-giving!"

[Please note that the three days of the Parish Mission are now on our parish website, stchrisparish.com. There is no way to capture in writing the full essence and holiness of this experience. You are encouraged to pray with this extraordinary message. As it changes your life, you move into a more intimate relationship with God. Be not afraid.]

The first evening focused on what it means to be in communion with God, how much God loves us and wants only good for us. Bishop Woost asked those in attendance to contemplate how the gift of Eucharist can help to bring us into closer communion with God on a daily basis. Jesus gives us his example of always praying and praising God first. By doing so, we come into closer communion with God on a daily basis. This occurs when we listen to Christ, when we believe that Christ is present and will speak to us. Quoting St. Benedict, Bishop Woost encouraged us to "listen with the ears of your heart," meaning that we are to be receptive to the voice of God and the needs of God's people. We are to trust that God will speak to us in some or many ways. Jesus waits for us to call upon him, he does not worry about our stench (sin) and loves us without partiality. Do we believe that God will touch us in some way, that Jesus is near and will answer our prayer?



Since the presence of God abides within us, we become tabernacles. He is among us and will never reject or stop believing in us. During this first evening, we were all given small sponges. During this first evening we were invited to come forward and dig our hand in holy water and bless ourselves. Then we received a small sponge to take home as a

reminder to soak up God's love each day. It is impossible to separate us from God's love, so we surrender our concerns to God. On this first night, each of us wrote down the one thing that keeps us from surrendering ourselves entirely. The notes were collected and placed

at the front of the Church, where they remained for the three days. Bishop Woost assured us that he as well as the priests and seminarians of the diocese would be praying for our needs. Incense was used generously throughout the three evenings of the Mission to symbolize our prayers going up to God.



On night two, we left Church with a small votive candle and instructions to "be light to others ... we are the light of the world, the light of Christ to others." In the story of the multiplication of fish and loaves, Jesus tells the apostles (and us) to feed the hungry that have gathered and to transform them by giving of ourselves entirely. Jesus is key to living life to the full. Just as he took, he broke, he blessed and he gave, we are to do the same. Together we "feast upon the divine presence, the body and blood of Christ." In this manner, we invite the Lord to draw near as we become more aware of God's presence. We offer ourselves to God by praying radically, go forth with reverence and become Eucharist to each other. Bishop Woost warned us that "praying radically can be dangerous," in that we must respond to God's answer to prayer. Referring to Psalm 23, those at the Mission were reminded that God invites us to encounter the Risen Christ in our midst. We need not be afraid to draw near to God, and we can be radical about God dwelling within us because he mingles his life with ours. Citing the works of St. Therese of Liseux, we were encouraged to see ourselves as living monstrances, so that the presence of Christ can be seen.

Bishop Woost revealed the theme of the Mission on the second evening – Christ lives in each one of us. In the writings of St. Ephrem the Syrian (4th century writer, poet, song writer and theologian), we find that "in the Sacrament of the Eucharist our bodies are newly mingled with the heart of Christ. His voice is in our ears, and his brightness is in our eyes." As newly created beings

mingled with Christ in Eucharist we become noticeably different. Christ lives in us in a way that is powerful enough for others to see, because we are on fire, our hearts are burning within us at the sound of His voice. With our voices lifted up in prayer, these three days also brought the gift of song. Members of our music ministry led

us in songs like "Taste and See" and "Behold the Lamb," words that speak directly to the Mission's theme of joining our bodies with the body of Christ every time we partake of the Body and Blood, the whole of Jesus embracing the whole of us.



On the final day, the Gospel reading came from Luke 24:13-35, as Jesus joins two of his disciples walking on the road to Emmaus. Ultimately, Jesus reveals himself through the breaking of bread. As the eyes of the apostles were opened, their strong desire became that Jesus not leave them. After Jesus disappears, the apostles ask each other: "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road ...?" Just as with the disciples, the whole of

Christ embraces the whole of us. He still allows himself to be seen by us every day in so many ways. Eucharist is the only food that changes us in this complete and powerful way. When we pray, we do well to ask ourselves "who is it that we're approaching?" God is our dwelling place, and He will always gaze upon us with love. At the Mission's closing, Bishop Woost guided us through a reflection centered on a sacred icon by Russian artist Andrei Rublev (ca. 1411 or 1425-27) titled "The Icon of the Holy Trinity."

To end the evening, those in attendance were given the privilege of approaching the Altar, presenting our prayers and needs to the God who loves us. In response to the Trinity's invitation, we honored in our own way the very table where at every Mass we celebrate the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist – body, blood, soul and divinity – under the appearances of bread and wine. A prayer by St. Elizabeth of the Trinity, O.C.D. (1904), helped us bring closure to an amazing Parish Mission. From her personal notes, the prayer reads in part:

O CONSUMING FIRE, SPIRIT OF LOVE, COME UPON ME,

AND CREATE IN MY SOUL A KIND OF INCARNATION OF THE WORD:

THAT I MAY BE ANOTHER HUMANITY FOR HIM

IN WHICH HE CAN RENEW HIS WHOLE MYSTERY ...

O MY THREE, MY ALL, MY BEATITUDE, INFINITE SOLITUDE,

IMMENSITY IN WHICH I LOSE MYSELF,

I SURRENDER MYSELF TO YOU AS YOUR PREY ...

BURY YOURSELF IN ME THAT I MAY BURY MYSELF IN YOU UNTIL I DEPART TO CONTEMPLATE IN YOUR LIGHT

THE ABYSS OF YOUR GREATNESS.

CLASS SCHOOL RETREATS 2022-2023



The 6th, 7th, and 8th graders experienced the NET (National Evangelical Teams) Ministries Missionaries for their yearly class retreat. NET Ministries is an organization that has been around for 40+ years. NET sends out missionary teams in groups of 8-12 to proclaim the Gospel to Catholic youth. These missionaries' range in age from 18-25 years old. The theme of this retreat was *Love One Another*. Through skits,

witness talks, games, celebration of the Eucharist, and prayer, the junior high students of St. Christopher School learned that there is nothing that can separate them from the love of God. It was reported that one student went home very quiet. The parent kept asking if something was wrong. The student kept saying "nothing." Later that night, this child went to the parent and said, "nothing is wrong, something is right." The students said, "It was a "fulfilling" and "special" day. The student wasn't looking forward to the retreat other than dress down, but it ended up being so fun. The student continued, "But something in me changed today, I felt it. I know it was Jesus growing in my heart and body because he was showing me that he loves me and I really felt it, instead of just knowing it." The plan for future school years is to continue to have NET Missionaries present retreats to the 5th-8th grades.

Thirty-five of the 6th, 7th, and 8th graders took what they experienced in their class retreat and became the retreat leaders for the kindergarten through 5th grade retreats. The theme of the retreats for the younger grades was *God is With You Wherever You Go.* Again, through praise songs, prayer, skits, science experiments, Bible Story of Joseph's wrongful imprisonment, and even snacks, the older students presented to the younger students that our loving, merciful, and compassionate God is with us wherever we go! The junior high students met weekly to prepare the activities and materials needed to pull off three successful retreat days for the younger students. This model of retreats will continue for future school years. The leadership opportunity for our junior high students and the opportunity to share their faith and relationship with God with the younger students is priceless.

From April 26-28, 15 of the school's 6th graders attended the Faith and Science Retreat at Damascus Catholic Retreat Center in Centerburg, Ohio. They traveled there for a 3-day, 2-night retreat experience. The group was blessed with beautiful weather the first two days and the rain on the last day did not hinder the ability of the students to live the adventure of the Catholic Faith. Here is a snapshot of the faith and science topics taught on the retreat. Our faith is included in all the science experiences!

For Science – the students moved through nine different stations within the Damascus campus – four stations the first two days and one last station on the last day. These High Adventure activities touched on the topics of orientation (using compasses), physics (rock wall and high swing), aquatics, geology, wilderness survival training, and care of creation (two different hikes).

For Faith – The children learned about the four relationships: self-God, self-others, self-self, and self-creation. The children learned that they are each a Child of God and that God is a good, good Father. They were introduced to different forms of prayer and how to hear God speaking to them. They learned the form of prayer called, Lectio Divina. They learned that Worship means to give "worth." We spend a lot of time on things that we value and give worth – school, sports, our family & friends. Worship of a loving God, demonstrates our worth of that relationship. We prayed the greatest prayer – the Mass! Fr. John Chlebo lead all 150 participants on retreat in celebration of the Eucharist! The children were so grateful for his presence at Damascus! The children also received a prayer journal used on retreat and for continued use after the retreat. The students were shown all this through skits, witness talks, singing, and small groups with their assigned missionaries.

Mrs. Meler had the blessing of accompanying the group as the liaison between Damascus and St. Christopher School. For her, it was a JOY to watch the children experience our Catholic Faith in fun and freeing way. Watching them happily together as a group was a true gift. The students have already asked to return to Damascus next year for the Leadership Retreat and they hope to encourage other classmates to join them in living the adventure of the Catholic Faith! The students pray this continue to be an opportunity for future St. Christopher School 6th graders to grow in their faith and their personal relationship with Jesus Christ!

Digital Signage: We are reviewing hardware and software options for the installation of four digital signage venues on the campus. The proposed locations are in the Parish Center, the entrance to the School, and the Upper and Lower Gathering Areas. The signage will offer general parish/school/religious education news along with promotion of particular activities.

Revitalization of the St. Christopher Media Presence:

- Our web page is beautifully branded and full of vital information, but it needs a graphic facelift. New tweaks have made the calendar more accessible and moved some time-sensitive materials into higher visibility slots. The ultimate goal is to make sure that the parish, religious education and school pages are informative, attractive and easy to navigate.
- The activity of Facebook has increased. Using this both as a tool for advertising and evangelization, the goal is to engage more people in the life of the parish.
- St. Christopher YouTube Channel is primarily being used to facilitate our Mass livestreaming. Expansion of content is on the horizon.
- These three platforms require people to come to us. Hopefully in the future we will expand our resources to digital platforms and push text opportunities that will reach out to members directly.

Integrating processes: Efforts have begun to streamline registration process for events and religious education. This is going to take a little time since it involves the integration of calendar, financial, census information.

Support of volunteers: Over the summer, Terri will be reaching out to parish organizations to see what direct support can be provided for their work.

Service Opportunity:

- As the video production expands and our marketing efforts shift, there will be opportunities for interested parishioners to add their time and talent to the mix. Look for further information in the weeks ahead.
- The safety of our children is a priority. Terri will continue to work with staff and volunteers to keep us in compliance with the Virtus training our Diocese requires.

To Be Announced: Listening to the needs of the community is vital to where this all goes. We are off to a great start!

SINGING HOOSIERS CONCERT





On April 16, 2023, I celebrated 365 days as a Catholic. I was baptized, confirmed and received holy communion on Easter Vigil of 2022 at St. Christopher Parish after going through the RCIA process for many exciting months. St. Christopher responded to my interest in learning about the Catholic faith immediately and has been a home away from home for me the very moment I stepped through the doors. The openness that I felt at St. Christopher, and the love I grew

in of Christ and the faith, led me to pursue a deeper relationship with Him through my education at Franciscan University of Steubenville. I changed my major from nursing to theology, quite the leap, and started my academic career away from home knowing that St. Christopher Parish would always be praying for me and walking with me on my journey of faith.

Immediately when I got on campus, I felt called to get involved and form communities on and off the hill Franciscan is built upon. I joined a household, on campus groups of men or women that share unique charisms, pray together and grow in sisterhood or brotherhood, my own sisters growing in love of God through the intercession of St. Joseph. I went to the Works of Mercy fair and signed up for a variety of different outreach opportunities such as sidewalk counseling on freezing Saturday mornings outside abortion facilities or heading to Pittsburgh on Thursday evenings to volunteer and encounter the homeless. Through all these opportunities, I was able to grow in my own faith and desire to love people as I had been loved by God and others.

The Lord about a month into my first semester offered me the chance to go on mission in the Bronx. I had never thought of going on a mission, but a friend of mine told me to come to the fair because she was leading another team that spring. Hesitantly, I had agreed to go. The leads James and Anne gave a brief talk about Bronx mission. We would do ministry of presence, subway ministry, homeless ministry and work closely with the CFR friars, Con-Solatio and the Missionaries of Charity. I was interested, and after a conversation with James and prayer in our campus adoration chapel, I was determined to go on Bronx mission. I applied and was accepted three days after my interview to the team, unsure of how I was going to make it all work out but trusted that if God had truly desired me to go, he would make a way.

To serve our friends in the South Bronx, all the missionaries would have to fund raise. It was a stressful challenge. I reached out to St. Christopher curious if they would be able to help and once again was met with the same generosity and love that I had encountered when I first came to Mass in 2022. Through the generosity of those at St. Christopher, I was able to meet the deadline and serve our Lord and His people in the South Bronx. On March 11, 2023, we left at four in the morning for New York.

During preparation for mission, I had many questions about why the Lord called me to Bronx team. After going and returning home, I see clearly now why. I believe that God wanted me to pass on that love and compassion that I encountered from Him and St. Christopher to the many people in the South Bronx who are lacking in it. A woman on the subway told me that I was the first person to smile and speak to her on the metro in the fifty years she'd lived there, and I thought of the warm smiles of my parish family when I first was welcomed on Sunday. I was given the chance to love and encounter many individuals in their suffering, to enter more deeply into the Passion of Christ and the swords of Our Lady of Sorrows by making friends with those who did not have anyone to comfort them. I was shown the love and mercy of Christ through others, and the Lord offered me the chance to pass it on in a way that has forever changed my life. This life changing experience was thanks to St. Christopher Parish, and for that and all the kindness they have showed me, I will forever be grateful.

In January our parish started looking into sponsoring a family from Ukraine to come to the United States from their war-torn country. The

Diocese of Cleveland had asked parishes within the diocese to consider sponsoring a family. A committee was formed by Fr. Tim and research was started into how we could make this happen. It was suggested that instead of taking part in the Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowls for our annual parish Lenten project, that we do something to collect donations for a potential Ukrainian family. After a few weeks of discussion at our pastoral staff meetings, it was decided that we would hand out a bowl similar to the CRS Rice Bowls we had used in years past. There were hundreds of unused "rice bowls" in the Religious Education Office – how could we use what we already had to recycle these bowls? We put our heads together as a team and came up with an ingenious idea to turn the existing boxes inside out. Then we gave the boxes a new identity with a sticker. We needed to come up with a way to get 1,500 boxes ready in two weeks. It was a tall order, but we had the family in mind to keep us inspired. We had 6 ladies help start the process: Bonnie Twitchell, Carol Yelig, Cheryl Selak, Maggie McIntyre, Marilu Norena, and Colleen McKenna. They prepared the boxes so that 20 Confirmation volunteers could assemble them so the Ukraine Welcome Circle boxes were ready to hand out on Ash Wednesday, Lent Family Night, PSR, and St. Christopher School.

The collection for the UWC boxes was to run from Lent through the Easter season. The students in grades K-8 were asked to look for change, do extra chores, or give up something for Lent and give the extra money to the UWC boxes. So many students donated, even if it was just a few pennies, they wanted to give to "the least of our brothers and sisters." The children of the parish, as of April 30, had collected \$5,782 and the adults of the parish collected \$2,188 with the bowls plus (money donated online and in the collection basket); making a grand total of (\$75,000) collected so far. We are still accepting donations and will continue to do so. We have had such a positive response and appreciate every single penny that has been donated by each and every contributor.

Thank you for your heartfelt generosity. Our family from Ukraine arrived on April 27 at 2:21 a.m. at Cleveland Hopkins International Airport where they were met by members of the team and taken to their home in Parma! Welcome home to Cleveland. We can't wait to meet you!
