

### EXPRESSING APPRECIATION TO DEACON DENNIS

For the past eight years, our parish community has enjoyed the privilege of Deacon Dennis assisting at Mass and sharing his powerful homilies. On July 1, 2023, Deacon Dennis officially retired from the Diocese of Cleveland. His "farewell" Mass took place on the weekend of June 24 and 25. At every Mass, Fr. John Chlebo expressed his gratitude for the years of service Deacon Dennis provided to St. Christopher. He wished Deacon Dennis and his family the best during the retirement years. A "celebration of thanks" took place after each Mass that weekend. Deacon Dennis will return to St. Christopher as needed until he and his wife make a move south to be closer to family. He and Paula have been married 40 years. They are looking forward to this exciting new phase. The parish community wishes them safe travels, fun adventures and many holy moments along the way.

On the day of his celebration, Deacon Dennis bid us farewell and gave us the gift of a beautifully prepared homily based on the First Reading (Jer. 20:10-13). In part, his words cautioned us against being consumed by fear and reminded us to entrust our cares to God. His message beseeched us to follow Jeremiah's advice by denouncing those who persecute us, standing together as a "herd," following the Lord and his teachings, and standing our ground against those who seek to destroy our souls. He advised us to ensure that in our homes, workplace and life, we "promote Gospel values and not let ourselves become part of the culture that is trying to destroy that in which we believe. Jesus reminds us that each daughter and son of God is valuable to God. God loves and protects even the smallest sparrow, and we are worth more than many sparrows."

In discussing his calling, Deacon Dennis states that it was shortly after he became married to Paula that he started having a recurring dream in which he was standing before the altar. Not understanding its meaning, Dennis ignored the dream. Over the next 25 years, as the dream continued to recur, Deacon Dennis finally decided that God was calling him. However, he had no idea what God was calling him to do. After conversations with his parish priest and deacon, he decided to apply to the Diaconate. After his ordination, the dream stopped. Dennis realized that he had not chosen to become a deacon, but that God had chosen him. Though the seminary taught him what is required to be a deacon, it was in serving the family of God during the ordinary and the special times of their lives that he really learned to be a Deacon. Just like our own families, it is in the Sacraments that parish families grow together and form those lasting memories. He leaves us with this important question to contemplate: "God might be calling each of us to some portion of His plan. Are we ignoring God's request?"

#### A NEW JOURNEY FOR FR. TIM



On July 1, 2023, Fr. Tim began a new chapter in his calling to religious life. He was granted permission to retire but stay at St. Christopher. Thanks be to God, the change in his duties does not mean farewell, and his presence at St. Christopher will continue. Stating that his time at St. Christopher has been "the highlight" of his priesthood, Fr. Tim ponders how quickly the past 20 years have gone. He recalls the challenges of coming to St. Christopher in 2002 while still being the Sacramental Moderator of Annunciation Parish in Cleveland. Admittedly, those first few years were "a real trick, especially during the winter." He is grateful for the support and immense help of Fr. John Chlebo and Fr. Richard Bona during those early years. He explains that they were "all younger back then" and more readily able to meet the demands. Over 20 years later, Fr. Tim reports that he has lived with Fr. John longer than anyone else in his life. About Fr. John, he offers the following words: "Fr. John has been a good pastor and friend, whom I greatly appreciate. He continues to be an excellent brother priest and confidant.'

Fr. John had very kind words to say about Fr. Tim at each "farewell" Mass, including how happy he is to have Fr. Tim remain at St. Christopher. Their friendship is clearly a strong one with many shared experiences. Among the projects at St. Christopher that evoke fond memories for Fr. Tim is the 2008 renovation of the church. It was an extensive undertaking which resulted in a church environment that helps us to celebrate the Sacraments of our Catholic faith. Through the years, visitors from all walks of life have complimented on the beauty and brightness of our renovated Church. Fr. Tim proudly states that

"we do indeed have a magnificent worship space to give praise and thanks to our God." On Wednesday mornings, Fr. Tim can be found presiding at 11 a.m. Mass. The regulars at this Mass (preceded by the Rosary) appreciate Fr. Tim's powerful homilies and his prayers for "those who put on a uniform every day and place their lives at risk in order to protect and serve others."

Another project very dear to Fr. Tim's heart is being part of a parish that sponsored and continues to support the Kushnyr family, helping them escape from war torn Ukraine to the safety and security of the United States. Fr. Tim calls this "an act of genuine faith and charity by a parish that practices and demonstrates faith so vividly, a community that gives generously and abundantly to those in need as they witness powerfully to others." Fr. Tim's leadership of the Ukraine Welcome Circle has been instrumental in its huge success. In the words of Dmytro and Valeriia Kushnyr, Fr. Tim was an instant friend – welcoming, friendly and open. Upon meeting Fr. Tim, they felt that they already knew him. They were touched

by how loving he was to all of them, especially the love he showed their children from the start. "As we watched him hug the children, we realized that they were safe." They see Fr. Tim as the definition of "a good person, someone who not only does good things, but avoids doing bad things. That's what you realize when you talk to Fr. Tim or just stand next to him." Fr. Tim has become a good friend, mentor and spiritual advocate for the Kushnyr family and the entire UWC team. All are grateful to him!

In closing, Fr. Tim sends a message to the people of St. Christopher. He is grateful for all the Sacraments he has celebrated with us, from baptisms to funerals, and for inviting him into the most intimate moments of our lives. "Honestly, it is a real privilege of my priesthood to be invited into those most cherished moments and into your family's lives. I hope to be remembered as a man willing to listen and walk with others in faith as we journey together toward a fuller experience of the Kingdom of God."

#### JESUS IS WAITING FOR YOU!

This past June, we entered year two of the three-year Eucharistic Revival. Last year was the Year of Diocesan Revival, and this year is the Year of Parish Revival. The mission is to renew the church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The vision is to inspire a movement of Catholics across the United States who are healed, converted, formed, and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist and who are then sent out on a mission "for the life of the world." The Eucharist is the greatest gift that Jesus has given us because it contains his very self. The Eucharistic Revival is about the life of the Eucharistic Church, which centers on the celebration of the Eucharist. Our lives are meant to become a self-gift in imitation of Christ Jesus.

We will have Eucharistic exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Friday, September 8, from 11:30 until 3:30. It will continue on the First Friday of each month in the Prayer Room. "The worship of the Eucharist outside the Sacrifice of the Mass is a tribute of inestimable value in the life of the Church. Such worship is closely linked to the celebration of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The Most Holy Sacrament, when exposed, must never be left unattended." (USCCB Publication No. 5-595) Everyone is invited to spend a few minutes or more in adoration of our Lord, who is truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. We will arrange for at least two to three faithful to be present at fixed times. If you would like to sign up to commit to an ongoing Holy Hour or Holy Half Hour, please call me at the parish office at (440) 331.4255 x 105 or email me at mdifini@stchrisparish. com. There will also be a signup sheet in the Gathering Area.

"When we contemplate Christ present in the Blessed Sacrament, we are given the opportunity to thank him for his passion, death, and

glorious resurrection. Christ draws near to us, more intimate with us than we are with ourselves. He strengthens our share in his divine life, the life that transforms us into his likeness and, in the Spirit, he gives us access to the Father." (USCCB Publication No. 5-595)

What is the difference between perpetual adoration and perpetual exposition of the Blessed Sacrament? "The Blessed Sacrament may be adored while contained in the Tabernacle for an extended period of time; this is called 'perpetual adoration.' Perpetual exposition of the Blessed Sacrament is a liturgical act whereby the consecrated host is placed in a ciborium or in a monstrance outside of the tabernacle for an extended period of time so that the faithful may gather together to pray before the exposed Eucharist." (USCCB Publication No. 5-595) St. Alphonsus Liguori wrote: "Of all devotions that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us."

This is your personal time with Christ. You can pray the rosary, read the scriptures, ask for intercession, write a prayer journal, and pray spontaneously. Remember to recognize that you are in God's presence, and thank God for all the blessings God has given you. The Eucharist revives us and is the true presence of Jesus. Come and spend time with Him; He's waiting for you.

Because we are a community of faithful believers, I asked several parishioners what Eucharist means to them. I encourage you to ponder the same question and think of ways to make your life a gift for others. Here are some of their reflections on the question:

"I have always felt the transformational power of receiving the Eucharist. My grade school teachers who taught me about the sacrament did a good job of explaining the sanctity, grace, and mysteries surrounding the Eucharist. Those teachings have carried through my experiences of receiving Christ each week. I recently attended the training to become an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion. I am honored to have now the ability to extend this sacrament to the members of our parish community." ~ Emily Mcgee.

"The Eucharist ties everything together. It is the focal point of all our activities that help us in our search for the Lord Jesus." ~ Daniel Gauntner

"As a Catholic, I know Jesus is present in the Eucharist. But how do I feel this in my life? When I experience the Eucharist, I feel peace and comfort come over me, and I honestly feel that Jesus is encouraging me to be a better person." ~ Kathy Rohn.

"In reflecting on what the Eucharist means to me: I feel the Eucharist is an opportunity to receive the gift of God in a tangible way. It makes me feel refreshed and renewed. It's a source of comfort to lift my hands and receive the Body of Christ placed into them." ~ Mara Myers.

"Receiving the Eucharist, the living presence of Our Lord at Mass, for me, is the central moment of each day. This spiritual connection with Our Lord and His mystical body is a gift beyond explanation. Receiving the Eucharist gives me a sense of Unity with the Lord, and my loved ones living and deceased. The Communion of Saints is our living legacy." ~ Mary Ellen Grady.

"The Eucharist reminds me, each time I receive it, of the Last Supper where Jesus told his disciples "Do this in remembrance of me." ~ Angela Rosati.

"The Eucharist is the presence and gift of Jesus Christ. It reassures me that Christ is with me always. Receiving the Eucharist is my acceptance of Jesus Christ in body and spirit." ~ Chris Rosati

"Jesus comes to us and lives within us; it's the Holy Trinity dwelling within us; it's the summit of our Christian life." ~ David McVean

### WELCOME TO MUSIC DIRECTOR AND ORGANIST MAYUMI NARAMURA



New Music Director Mayumi Naramura began her ministry here at St. Christopher on July 1. If you've heard her play, her pedigree is apparent: she holds a degree in organ performance from the prestigious Oberlin College, as well as a master's degree in early keyboard from the University of Michigan. Interestingly, her first career was not in music, but in medicine.

Mayumi earned a medical degree from Kyoto University in her native Japan, where she worked in pediatric hematology/oncology for four years. She then decided to move into cancer research, which brought her to the United States. She began her research career in California, and as her career advanced, held subsequent positions with the Cleveland Clinic, Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, and the University of Nebraska Medical Center. She shared that she has lived on the East Coast, West Coast, and Midwest – everywhere except the South – and has a special affinity for the Midwest. It was while in Nebraska that she joined the St. Cecilia Cathedral Choir as an alto chorister and started a journey that would ultimately change her career path.

When the music director of the cathedral choir discovered that Mayumi had played piano since the age of four, she invited Mayumi to play the cathedral's organ, giving Mayumi her first exposure to the instrument that would claim her heart. The Archdiocese of Omaha offered private music lessons through the Saint Cecilia Institute, and Mayumi took advantage of this program to study organ with the cathedral music director. As she progressed, it was suggested she consider studying organ collegiately. While going back to school was not something Mayumi had anticipated doing, she was intrigued.

Around that same time, three work colleagues passed away within one year. As you might imagine, this brought home the idea that life is short. After much thought, she decided to seize the day and explored programs in organ performance, ultimately choosing Oberlin College. She had previously lived in the Cleveland area when working for the Clinic and liked the area. Also, Oberlin's program is strong in the area of early music, which was her primary area of interest. So, she made the jump from medicine to music and didn't look back.

After completing her undergrad at Oberlin, which included a minor in German, she enrolled in the University of Michigan to study Early Keyboard Performance, which incorporated instruments such as the harpsichord, clavichord, fortepiano, and of course, the organ. Throughout her studies, she had several opportunities to perform in Europe and even played an organ from the 17th century in the Netherlands.

Church ministry is not new to Mayumi. She worked within the diocese as a part-time organist for Our Lady of Peace near Shaker Square and then Our Lady of Lourdes in Slavic Village – she even commuted on weekends from Michigan while completing her master's degree! As she was nearing the end of her program in Michigan, she happened upon the job posting for the position at St. Christopher. Although she wasn't actively looking for a change, the opportunity to serve in a large, active parish was "too good to pass up."

Mayumi is a fan of traditional music and shared, "I want to rediscover the treasure trove of church music. There is a lot of old music that has been passed down for a long time." She continued, "We need to perpetuate the art of organ music. Fewer young people are exposed to organ music, which isn't just church music." She's open to the idea of teaching organ so she can give young musicians the same opportunity afforded to her. She also hopes to explore the idea of organ or chamber music concerts at St. Christopher.

#### Turning taxes into tuition

The Angel Scholarship Fund is a program established by the Ohio General Assembly, which provides Ohioans with a 100% income tax credit against the Ohio income tax liability for cash contributions to certified organizations that grant scholarships to students, including those attending Catholic schools. The maximum credit amount is currently \$750 (\$1,500 if married filing jointly where each individual contributes \$750). This is a permanent tax credit written into the Ohio statute.

During 2022, St. Christopher Parish attempted to communicate broadly the changes in the Ohio tax law through a variety of medium to a variety of audiences. We are thankful to the 152 families who elected to have their income taxes be allocated directly to St. Christopher School. These 152 families' elections resulted in St. Christopher receiving \$130,850.00 to apply toward scholarships to students attending St. Christopher School. Many students have benefited from these awards, allowing their family to continue to receive a faith-based education from St. Christopher School. However, many more students could benefit, if more parishioners took advantage of this income tax redirection.

A few facts to note. Of the 152 taxpayers electing their Ohio income tax go to St. Christopher School, only 99 taxpayers were parishioners of St. Christopher Parish who represented \$94,225 of the benefit received by St. Christopher School. - Our server has reached the end of its useful life so we are currently migrating our information to a secure cloud location.
- This migration was the logical time to also evaluate our current database structure. The staff consulted on this matter in August. This could mean a return of a parish app with more features and operation integration. So watch for more news in the next few weeks.
- The wiring and hardware for extending our wi-fi signal is currently being installed. We will be installing screens for digital signage in the upper gathering area and outside of the school entry doors. Two other displays will be mobile so that we can use them in different areas around the campus.

- Work on the parish site is progressing a little more slowly. I will be contacting each of the groups to get updated information about their needs and will continue to make it more responsive.
- The tech@stchrisparish.com address will also be the place to send materials for posting on our website and Facebook pages. Again, operational at the end of August, you can submit information that is already in an uploadable format or raw data. I will format the material for you and let you know when the posts are scheduled.
