### ADVENT: A SEASON OF ACTIVE WAITING AND HOPEFUL EXPECTATION

We are just beginning the new liturgical year in the Church's calendar, which always starts with the Advent season. By that time, it will also mark my first-year anniversary of coming, arriving and being here with you as part of this parish community. In the same way, the word Advent comes from the Latin word Adventus, meaning "coming" or "arrival." Since I arrived here, I've had many exciting first-time experiences – anticipating my first Christmas here, my first Holy Week, my first parish weekend, my first Thanksgiving, and my first experiences with the Guardians, Cavaliers, and Browns games. I've also experienced anticipating my first full-blown winter, spring, summer, and now autumn.

Advent feels much like this. It's a season of anticipation, where we wait and prepare for something meaningful and new, just as I have done with these "firsts" in my journey with you. But what exactly are we preparing for in the season of Advent, and who is coming?

In Advent, we celebrate the coming of Christ in three distinct ways: His coming in history over 2,000 years ago as a baby in Bethlehem, His coming into our hearts daily, and His future coming in glory at the end of time. So, Advent is a time of recognizing Christ's constant presence in our lives while also anticipating His glorious return. This season is not just a time to reflect on the past or imagine the distant future, more importantly it's a time to prepare ourselves spiritually and practically for Christ's presence among us today. Days from now we will witness lights in the streets and homes, the decorations in the church, and the gatherings of family and friends, all will help create an atmosphere of expectation. But Advent is more than just a festive mood, it's an invitation to active waiting.

The idea of waiting often evokes passivity. We might picture waiting as sitting idly, hoping for something to happen like sitting down in Cleveland Hopkins International Airport's pre-departure area waiting for my boarding time or sitting down inside Sport Clips Haircuts for my turn. But Advent calls us to a different kind of waiting, an active, engaged, and purposeful waiting. We are not simply waiting for Christmas day to arrive; we are preparing ourselves for the coming of Christ.

Advent is a time to deepen our prayer life and reconnect with God. Through the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist and Reconciliation, we prepare our hearts for Christ's coming. This might look like setting aside more time for personal prayer, attending an Advent retreat, or participating in the parish's reconciliation services. Active waiting also means looking outward. As we prepare for Christ, we are reminded of His call to love and serve others, especially those in need. The Gospel teaches us that when we serve the least among us, we are serving Christ Himself. Our parish's outreach programs, like Church in the City, Christmas in July, Lent soup supper, Thanksgiving food drive, the annual Christmas G.I.F.T., and many more acts of kindness are not just social obligations; they are ways to encounter Christ as we wait for His coming.

Christ is not just coming in the future; He is already here, knocking at the door of our hearts. Our waiting is active because we strive to recognize His presence every day in our prayers, in the Eucharist, and in each other. Advent is a time to intentionally invite Christ into our lives, not just on Christmas morning but in every moment.

Ultimately, Advent is a season of hope. It's a time when we are reminded that amid the busyness, stress, and challenges of life, God is coming to us. Christ's arrival, whether at Bethlehem, in our hearts, or at the end of time, brings light into the darkness. Our waiting, then, is not just anticipation but hopeful expectation, knowing that Christ's presence will transform our lives.

As we journey through this Advent season at St. Christopher Parish, may we embrace the active waiting it calls for. May we prepare our hearts, serve one another, and welcome Christ into our lives with joy and hope. Let's make this season not just a time of preparation for Christmas, but a time of transformation for ourselves and our community.

## ANGEL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In September 1926, St. Christopher School opened in two classrooms attached to the church building. Staffed by the Sisters of Humility of Mary, the school initially welcomed students in grades one through four. Fast forward to 2024. St. Christopher School now operates out of a beautiful building, dedicated to providing an environment where Catholic values, service, excellence, and community are shared with all by loving God, studying hard, and being kind to each other.

Over these 98 years, St. Christopher School has educated thousands of children in faith formation, sending them out into our community to excel academically, civically and spiritually. The school remains robust today, continuing in the tradition, which began back in September 1926.

In order to continue to provide our children with an opportunity to receive their faith formation and academic excellence through St. Christopher School, we have an opportunity to provide enhanced funding to the school in the form of scholarships.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

The State of Ohio legislature has enacted a Tax Credit Scholarship program, whereby individuals may receive a 100% tax credit against their Ohio income tax liability, with a maximum credit of \$750 for individual filers (\$1,500 for married couples filing jointly)! All of this is available at NO COST TO YOU!

You have the power to fund Catholic education here at St. Christopher School. All students at St. Christopher School are eligible to receive a scholarship from the Angel Scholarship Fund. This fund is being managed locally by the Diocesan Catholic Community Foundation.


## WHAT DO YOU DO TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM?

1. Review your tax liability from last year (2023 1040 UT, line 8C) to help estimate the amount of your tax liability. Remember, you can take a maximum credit amount of \$750 for individuals and \$1,500 for married filing jointly.

#### Turning taxes into tuition

- Contribute to the Angel Scholarship Fund in 2024 at www.catholiccommunity.org/angel, or by calling (216) 902-1312. Don't forget to designate St. Christopher School for your Ohio state tax deductible contribution. If your tax liability is less, then you can contribute less.
- 3. Claim your tax credit on your 2024 Ohio tax form with the tax credit receipt that will be mailed to you from the Diocesan Catholic Community Foundation.

During 2023, we are grateful to the 197 parishioners and friends of St. Christopher School who designated \$186,680 of their State of Ohio income tax dollars for St. Christopher School. These funds went directly to helping our school families through scholarships, which lowered their tuition obligation.



We ask you to please help the St. Christopher School community to continue to thrive by maintaining our educational excellence, both academically and spiritually. Do not hesitate to follow the steps above as it only takes a few minutes and the benefits last a lifetime. You can direct any questions

#### WALKING WITH PURPOSE



On Thursday, October 3, over 30 women from St. Christopher Parish gathered in Mary's Room to embark on a journey of faith through Walking with Purpose. Walking with Purpose is an apostolate that offers Catholic

Bible studies for women, aiming to bring participants into a deeper personal relationship with Christ. Through a blend of personal study and small group discussions, the program helps women connect everyday challenges with solutions rooted in the teachings of Christ and the Catholic Church. The St. Christopher Walking with Purpose program is part of a national initiative that engages over 100,000 women in more than 600 parishes across the United States and internationally. Sara Salupo and Tiffany Barker, the Parish Coordinators, work closely with the national program to offer this experience to the women of St. Christopher.

Currently, the parish is offering "Opening Your Heart: The Starting Point" on Thursday evenings. This study addresses fundamental questions of the Catholic faith and each participant's relationship with Jesus Christ. Throughout the 22-week session, attendees explore essential questions for a meaningful spiritual journey:

- How can one prioritize life according to faith?
- How does a spiritual life connect with everyday experiences?
- How can someone develop a personal relationship with Christ?

Alongside the small group sessions, Connect Coffees offer an opportunity for women from the community to

gather for meaningful conversation and view an Opening Your Heart video. All women are warmly invited to attend the next Connect Coffee on Thursday, January 9, 2025, at 7:30 p.m. in Mary's Room. These sessions are open to any woman interested in learning more about Walking with Purpose.

#### GREAT LAKES THEATER SCHOOL RESIDENCY PROGRAM



Through a generous grant from the Margaret A. Cargill Foundation, the Great Lakes Theater School Residency Program came to St. Christopher School for two weeks. Trained actorteachers used an interactive hands-on approach to expose the students to classic literature from an actor's point of view. The residency program is designed to be hands-on, creative, and interactive. Each day regardless of age level consists of three components: acting, discussion, and theater exercises.

Residency actor-teachers not only performed for the students but directed student performances while working alongside the students to bring literature to life. Each performance was followed by a group discussion to reinforce the pleasure, power, and relevance of classic literature.

Grades K-3 performed scenes based on *The Snowy Day, Where the Wild Things Are, Anasi the Spider, The Sneetches,* and *The Giving Tree.* 

Grades 4-5 covered topics found in classics, such as *Pandora's Box*, *Damon and Pythias*, *The Turtle Who Wanted to Fly, The Princess and the Beggar*, plus *The Giving Tree*.

Grades 6-8 explored the themes from *The Diary of Anne Frank, A Raisin in the Sun, Romeo and Juliet, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Macbeth,* and *Julius Caesar.* 

The reviews from the St. Christopher School teachers and students were grand! Each individual classroom attended one session per day. Using the small groups gave great opportunity for individualized work within the program. The students loved how interactive the daily hour-long program was and how much fun the actors brought to each session. Each student was a part of each story whether being an actor themselves or being in the audience. Even the audience participated in some way making it even more interesting and interactive for the students. Students were able to participate in the "plays" as much as he/she wanted to be involved. As the "plays" unfolded, the students could visualize and interpret the literature in a very meaningful way. The costumes were minimal, yet the students loved donning them. Students enjoyed each day and teachers were able to connect what they were doing in the sessions to what they have been learning in the classroom.

One teacher noted, "I liked how students learned about improv, singing, silent, and script styles of performances. The leaders, Tim and Lindy, were engaging and had the attention of the students. They were able to relate the stories to real life. For example, *The Princess and the Beggar*, Korean Folktale, illustrated the idea of working together in a non-speaking performance. The leaders talked about how the teamwork skills of focus, listening, patience, calmness, volume, and concentration play an important part when interacting with others. Tim and Lindy talked about teamwork and friendship and its application from the program to real-life.

Hopefully, the Great Lakes Theater School Residency Program can continue to be an annual enriching program for the St. Christopher School students.


